Dear Friends.

What an incredibly exciting year it has been for the NYIC!

As of this writing, we are on the verge of seeing the President announce long-awaited administrative relief that will potentially open the door for millions of America's immigrants to be protected from deportation and to work legally. This major victory has been the culmination of a twoyear effort of our statewide New Yorkers for Real Immigration Reform campaign, working with our national allies to push the President to take this historic step for immigrants.

But we've been up to much more than that. Throughout 2014, we've continued to make real progress in reforms at many levels: helping win major victories in New York City such as a municipal ID and detainer reform; ensuring that immigrants can get affordable and quality health care; fighting for New York's immigrant students to get the support they need; and lifting up immigrants' voices in the 2014 elections through our Immigrants Vote! campaign. Along the way, we convened the first ever conference to coordinate broad legal services on the City and State level this June through the New York Immigrant Assistance Consortium (NYIAC), bringing together 300 community leaders to discuss how to prepare for administrative relief. Moving forward, we'll play a lead role in ensuring that up to a guarter of a million New Yorkers can walk through this historic door of opportunity and get the work permits, drivers' licenses and deportation protection they need.

This 2014 Annual Report gives you a guick snapshot of the Coalition's efforts this past year, and is dedicated to our members, our supporters, our allies. With your invaluable support, we've made big strides in 2014 - and are poised to take even bigger ones in 2015. Thank you for your commitment to building a better New York!

1/10/14: "Immigrant advocates in New York have responded to Governor Andrew Cuomo's State of the State address by announcing their own agenda for 2014. The Coalition has released its own '2014 Immigrant Equality

Agenda' containing ten policy items that advocates will continue to push for in New York. The 2014 Immigrant Equality Agenda also includes raising the minimum wage, promoting college readiness for English language learners and protection from harsh enforcement."

✓ JANUARY 2014 & ONGOING: REACHING THE "HARD-

TO-REACH" UNDOCUMENTED YOUTH POPULATION A new Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) Initiative, supported by the City of New York, was created to conduct outreach, provide legal assistance, and expand adult education programming for young people who would qualify for DACA. The NYIC is leading the citywide outreach component of this effort, coordinating 26 outreach providers that are working in collaboration with 70 adult education and legal groups. Our outreach providers have done an exemplary job reaching out to "hard-to-reach" young undocumented immigrants to enroll them in DACA. Through their outreach efforts, we have referred more than 3,000 individuals to legal and literacy providers.



the Senate this year, we are rebooting for next year's campaign and won't stop until this is official legislation in New York!



Advocates to renew push for driver's licenses for undocumented residents

January 9, 2014 "The license issue affects immigrants without permanent residence in substantial ways and puts many at risk of detention and deportation after traffic stops for unlicensed and uninsured driving," advocates said.



FEBRUARY-JULY 2014: A NEW YORK CITY ID FOR ALL NEW YORKERS At the State of the City, Mayor Bill de Blasio made a historic announcement that he will support a New York City ID card for all New Yorkers regardless of immigration status—a huge victory for New York immigrant communities! Immigrants who lack access to a form of ID will be able to use this card to access libraries and municipal buildings, open bank accounts, sign leases, and munic more! All year the NYIC worked as part of the New York City Municipal ID Coalition to ensure that the NYC Municipal ID card will have broad appeal and that immigrants and other vulnerable communities can access this ID safely. In January 2015 the card will be rolled out with multiple benefits and discounts for all New Yorkers, including a one-year membership at 33 of the City's leading cultural institutions!

De Blasio Proposes Municipal ID Card Regardless of Immigration Status According to the New York Immigration Coalition, the measure... will improve this community's day-to-day lives. "You can go to the police and you can show this as proof of identification," said Steven Choi, executive director of the NYIC. "You will be able to access certain city buildings. As a result of our advocacy, you can now go into public schools and be able to meet with your kids' teachers.

△ > FEBRUARY 2014 & ONGOING ALL YEAR: NYIC'S KEY TO THE CITY PROGRAM EXTENDS IDENTIFICATION DOCUMENTS AND SERVICES TO THOUSANDS

The City Council-funded "Key to the City" Initiative has taken place in schools in each borough since 2011, organized by the NYIC in collaboration with schools, community partners, and the consulates of Mexico, El Salvador, Ecuador, Guatemala, Peru, and the Dominican Republic. The Initiative promotes immigrant integration in a variety of ways: facilitating immigrant parent access to their children's schools and to financial services by providing them with acceptable identity documents: offering workshops on the college preparation process; providing DACA information, legal screenings and referrals, adult

education programs; and offering assistance on filing taxes, among other services. Most recently, the program is providing workshops for the Chinese community as well. In the past two-and-a-half years, 14,334 consular IDs

and foreign passports have been distributed, and 22,051 community members provided with this broad range of services—a huge achievement for the betterment of New York immigrant communities!

MARCH-APRIL 2014: AFFECTING **CHANGE ON THE CITY LEVEL On**

March 3rd, Councilmember Carlos Menchaca hosted NYIC's legislative breakfast to inform the City of NYIC's top priorities for the year. A panel of experts spoke about our top City agenda items, including immigration enforcement issues, and ensuring adequate resources for immigrant services such as ESL classes, legal services, and integration efforts.

✓ On April 10th, NYIC's New York City membership met with City Council Members and the Commissioner of the Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs to discuss our top priorities. In all. 56 individuals representing 29 NYIC member organizations participated in 21 legislative meetings to urge support for pressing issues including Municipal ID cards for all New Yorkers, educational equity for immigrant students, and health care for all. Our efforts were enormously successful! At a press conference on July 1st, NYIC was joined by Councilmember Menchaca to celebrate and discuss the City Council's FY15 budget, which slated \$10.3 million dollars for the expansion of programs and services for immigrant communities!

Nearly 300 immigrant advocates, legal service providers, government officials, and community members contributed to discussions on how to better coordinate support for New York's immigrant communities. Sessions covered topics such as how to combat immigration fraud, prepare for administrative relief, and incorporate lessons from DACA, past legalization efforts, and other mass assistance efforts like those following Hurricane Sandy and 9/11.



○ ONGOING: PROTECTING ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS AND SUPPORTING **IMMIGRANT PARENTS** Conducting cutting edge advocacy, the NYIC's Education Advocacy Collaborative has worked tirelessly to educate the City and State on the needs of English Language Learners (ELLs) and immigrant parents-particularly around the issue of providing adequate interpretation services at schools and the obstacles that immigrant parents face when enrolling their children in school. In an effort to continue supporting immigrants parents, the NYIC continued its training series for New York immigrant parents on how to send their children to college by using our guide, "Your Children Can Go to College -Yes They Can!". The guide has been translated

into several new languages including Bengali,
Arabic, and Haitian Creole! The NYIC and project partners have distributed 20,000 guides and reached
approximately 1,500 parents over the last two years in multiple languages.

$\triangle \nabla$ ongoing: advocating for greater access to health care

NYIC's Health Advocacy team made enormous strides this year from educating hundreds of immigrant New Yorkers on access to healthcare and enrollment options to lobbying the City to insure more eligible immigrants and boosting access to health care for the undocumented.





➤ ONGOING: NYIC TRAINING INSTITUTE As the state-designated trainer on Board of Immigration Appeals (BIA) Accreditation and Recognition, the NYIC, with support from the Department of State's Office for New Americans, develops an intensive 40-hour training to help non-profit groups qualify for BIA recognition and accreditation, expanding the corps of groups who are authorized and qualified to provide immigration legal assistance. This year, the NYIC conducted four intensive 40-hour BIA accreditation trainings.

These week-long trainings, which include site visits to immigration court, mock trials, and visits to citizenship ceremonies, along with a substantive immigration law curriculum, take place across New York State.

✓ ONGOING: NYIC'S REGIONAL ADVOCACY

The NYIC has expanded its reach by hiring regional advocacy coordinators to support our member groups in Westchester and Long Island! On October 16th, we worked with our partner agencies in Westchester and Lower Hudson Valley to respond to vicious political ads scapegoating immigrant communities. In Long Island, we are working to support our partners to hold County Executive Ed Mangano accountable to the executive orders

Ed Mangano accountable to the executive orders he signed in 2013 guaranteeing free translation and interpretation to Limited-English Proficient (LEP) residents of Nassau County at county agencies.





△▽ NOVEMBER 2014: IMMIGRANTS VOTE!
This year, the NYIC's Immigrants Vote! campaign, made up of 10 active partner organizations, led an aggressive voter engagement program in New York City, Long Island, and Westchester county.
This year, we contacted 20,000 immigrant

voters and registered 12,000 voters in the lead up to midterm elections!

IMMIGRATION REFORM PHASE II: WE'RE "ALL IN FOR RELIEF" As part of NYRIR, we shifted our campaign to call on President Obama to act where Congress has failed. With 1,100 deportations a day, NYRIR campaign members made an urgent call for executive action. Our message to the President: We can no longer wait while our communities suffer; you can provide administrative relief to stop unjust deportations and keep families together. Through sending

postcards to the White House, thousands of calls, and several creative actions including a **350-person townhall** to share our

communities' stories and a 400-person human chain around New York's immigration court at 26 Federal Plaza, we successfully captured the attention of the

White House.
